Controls data access based on a user's role (page manager, editor, publisher, administrator).	Administrators can create user access under Administrator, Editor, Author, Contributor, and Subscriber categories.
Easy to retrieve and store data.	PHP and MySQL provide easy storage and data retrieval on a WordPress site.
Helps reduce redundant information and input.	Version control for pages and posts are handled by plug-ins that reduces any redundant input.
Enables communication and collaboration between users.	WordPress provides Email notifications to users and groups for updates, page creation, and posts.

However, if you want to utilize its powerful CMS tools, you'll need to do some customization with widgets and plug-ins. In some cases, if you need to match your company Web site, you may even need to do a bit of customization to the overall look and feel. Here are some tools you'll need in order to accomplish this.

WordPress Plug-Ins

WP-CMS Post Control

This plug-in is highly valued for its ability to customize your WordPress site. It allows you to hide items, and provides a lot of control over the way in which WordPress creates and displays content. WordPress.org gives this plug-in a 4.5 out of 5-star rating.


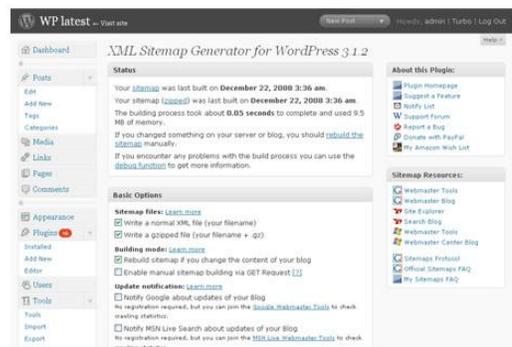
CMS Tree Page View

This plug-in provides a directory-style outline of your entire WordPress site. This includes both pages and posts. It also allows you to re-order pages, search, view, and edit pages with a click of the mouse.

White Label CMS

This WordPress plug-in allows you to have a lot of control over how your WordPress site looks. You can access widgets and menus with it, and you can also customize the dashboard, logos, and remove menus. If you're a developer, this plug-in will allow you to provide a simplified and customized look and feel to your client's WordPress sites.

White Label CMS also provides you with the ability to remove the panels from the dashboard and add your own customized panel, add custom logos to the footer and header, and customization of the login page, which allows you to customize your WordPress site with your own branding.
